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The Subud Australia Congress 2020

This year the Subud Australia Congress was held from January 11-18 at the Sunshine Coast Recreation Centre at Currimundi in Queensland, a location we have frequently used in the last few years. It provides access to the beach, making it very suitable for a family holiday as well as Subud business.

Our meeting was of course preceded by the biggest disaster in Australia's history. That is, the catastrophic bushfires which began in August last year, several months ahead of when the usual bushfire season begins, and fires were burning all across Australia as our Congress began.

Twenty-nine people have died in the fires. More than 2000 houses and other properties have been destroyed. Millions of hectares of forest have burned, and thousands of native animals have been killed and injured. The iconic

animals of Australia, such as koala and kangaroo, which appear on our nation's coat of arms, we now see on TV shivering from their burns.

The nation is now engaged in an often acrimonious debate about why this has happened and who or what is to blame. Not only for the extent of the fires, but also the years of unbroken drought which have devastated some parts of our country.

Is it all signs of the impact of climate change? Is it that there should have been much more burn-off of undergrowth? A Royal Commission will be held to investigate all this.

How did this affect our Congress? Perhaps very little on the surface. Very few of us were directly impacted by the fires. A few people had to evacuate their homes as fires approached. But none of us were killed or injured and one member lost property.

Some had to stay away from their homes in major cities like Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra where the air quality fell dramatically because of smoke from the fires. At one point during Congress, Canberra was declared the

city with the worst air in the world. During Congress Melbourne was the declared the worst.

There were no big discussions about all this on the agenda at Congress. Perhaps there is enough of it already in mainstream politics and media.

The blessing was that for the period of our Congress the conditions of heat and lack of rain which had made almost every part of our continent vulnerable to fire abated.

A cyclone blew down from Indonesia, entered our country around Darwin, and spilled its rain in abundance in Queensland where we were congressing.

I know that for myself I very much appreciated the cool, moist conditions. It was still warm enough to swim in the sea and as someone remarked, "You can't get wetter than wet."

Best Ever Congress

There was a general agreement that this was our best Congress ever. And not just best; it was a "quantum leap" forward, especially in terms of the relationships between us which became deeper and more natural than ever before.

In other words, an increase in harmony, of the real sort, which can create bonds strong enough to be the foundation for both personal development and collective endeavour such as enterprises and other projects.

The core of the Congress is always the latihan and many people commented on the power of the latihan at this one. Our National helpers had met for several days with the International Helpers to really prepare the "space". Bapak and Ibu were also present in recordings of their talks and videos of Subud members reminiscing about their contact with them.

I Am in Transition

Perhaps the catchphrase of this Congress was, "I am in transition". If you sat down at a table someone was sure to say, "I am in transition", and someone else would say, "Me too! I'm transitioning", and someone else would say, "No, none of you know what transition is. I'm really transitioning."

I was having a conversation with a little girl and I thought she said, "I'm in transition", copying what all the adults were saying, but what she actually said was, "I'm in Transition". Transition

An International Congress

More international visitors attended this Congress than we have ever had before. They included visitors from New Zealand, Indonesia, England, Switzerland, Holland and the USA. All six of the Asian zone International helpers were present.

Ramzi Addison, Kejiwaan Councillor from New Zealand was there. Hannah from Holland, currently the Zone Three Co-ordinator, flagged the meeting which is coming up in Assisi later this year. (See the story about it in this issue.)

Other international officeholders who came included Rusydah, from Germany, currently the SICA chair, and a strong supporter of the YES Quest as it seems to be fulfilling the SICA mandate of helping people find their talent.

Gaye from Indonesia, well-known for the ecotourism enterprise she runs in Kalimantan, also talked about her role as the Co-Chair for SESI. She presented about all the projects in Rungan Sari, such as BCU School and the Permakultur Foundation.

Nahum, the WSA Chair was present, with Rosario, the Deputy Chair, and Suyono, the Executive Chair of WSA. They amplified our understanding of the international organisation and its current aims and concerns. This issue of Subud Voice carries the report put out by WSA about their meeting which was held in Indonesia last year.

There were many informal visitors, such as Andrew, well known for his "green oak" enterprise in England, using traditional materials and methods to create amazing structures. He is also a strong supporter of the YES Quest and was one of those attending the Congress who also attended YES Quest Facilitator Training in the period leading up to Congress.

Kenneth and Fatijah from the USA regularly attend our congresses. That's one way we have of telling when it's a congress time in Australia. Those migratory birds from the USA always appear.

There were also presentations about archives and MSF.

There was a sense from all these international visitors that Subud Australia is in good shape and has much to offer the rest of the Subud world

The Bustillos

Also present in abundance were members of the Bustillo clan. About 40 of them came to our Congress. >

The total attendance was about 160 people including children, so it would have been a big hole in our numbers if the Bustillos had not come.

As is well known, the Bustillo family originated in Colombia and now boasts four generations in Subud. I believe that the original patriarch of the family was the first person to be opened in Subud in Latin America. The family, including those who have married into it, runs to perhaps hundreds of people in various parts of the world including Indonesia, USA and Norway and now many have also settled in Australia.

They add that touch of Latin vitality and colour to our meetings. Furthermore, it is very difficult to think of a Subud wedding that has happened in Australia in the last two or three years, which has not involved Bustillos as brides or grooms. Without the Bustillos very few young people in Subud Australia would have been able to find Subud partners.

Rusdi Bustillo has been appointed the on-theground organiser for the next World Congress in Kalimantan, Rusdi's cousin Bachrun was at our Congress and talked about the project that has developed in Rungan Sari around soccer Their soccer foundation brings sport to thousands of young people who would otherwise not be able to afford a soccer ball. It brings spin-offs in health, education and self-esteem.

One branch of the family has created a chain of flower shops in Brisbane with flowers imported from Colombia. I congratulated Emiria one of the drivers behind this endeavour saying, "I hear you now have six flower shops in Brisbane."

"No, we don't," she replied.

"Oh, that's disappointing, I was told you did."

"No", she said, "we have seven flower shops in Brisbane."

The YES Quest

Transition is very much the theme of the YES quest which was developed more than 20 years ago in Australia by Peter Jenkins, originally with

the idea of helping young people in Subud find direction in life. But in the last year or two it has been gathering energy and momentum and it also provided a backdrop to this Congress.

It is "in transition" to becoming a much bigger endeavour involving many people, with courses directed towards the general public as well as to Subud members. There are plans to create a, "Communiversity", where various locations in Subud around the world could be utilised to provide Gap-Year activities.

In the weeks leading up to the Congress, YES Quest activities were held at Sine Cera, the rainforest retreat property which is part of the Subud charity Dharma Care.

First, there was a training program for people who are interested in becoming YES Quest Facilitators. This was facilitated by Marlena Basser and Roland Fraval. Then there was an actual full-on YES Quest attended by the founder, Peter, who had never actually attended one before as a participant. Everyone says he did very well, and he is the oldest person yet to have done the YES Quest.

And there were others too. Maxwell and Asmaniah from Canberra, no spring chickens, also did the Quest. So, it's no longer just for young people, but also for older people who may be wishing to find new directions or to clarify, confirm and strengthen those they already have.

Asmaniah gave me a lucid and fulsome account of what it's like to go on a YES Quest. (Her son Roland was one of the facilitators.) The way she put it was that she wanted to make sure she didn't die with a sense that there was something she should have done and had failed to do it. She wants to make sure that all her potentials are used up before she passes over.

It was noticeable that the Quest as well as bringing participants new insights and aspirations, creates very strong bonds between the people who have done it.

Business

The Subud Australia Council met for several days under the guidance of chairman, David, and committee councillor, Bruce. One of the major initiatives to emerge from the meeting was that the council committed funds to begin the process of designing a building to house the WSA archives in Canberra. This long overdue

process will also require the assistance of brothers and sisters worldwide.

There are also moves afoot to redesign our congresses so that we can develop them on properties we own as our own Subud Centerprises.

New appointments at Congress included new Subud Youth reps, Raqeema Evans for the women replacing Rosalia Lonergan, and Sebastian Madden for the men. Kenneth Colette was replaced as vice-chair of Subud Australia by Latimah Jones. Alana Simpson was replaced as the SIHA coordinator by Matthew Pienaar from Perth.

Irwan Wyllie, CEO of Dharma care, talked about the many projects that this charity is involved in including those in Australia and overseas such as the project supporting women in Cambodia. For several years now Dharma Care has also spearheaded plans to acquire land and create a Subud community.

Irwan was able to report how this idea has developed from the model of a retirement village which is subject to many regulations, to a much more suitable and flexible concept known as Manufactured Home Estates.

Trivia Night and Other Diversions

As well as the official business there were of course many opportunities for just relaxing and having fun. Though the weather was cool, and the rain frequent you could still swim in the rugged surf or the placid lake of the estuary. As someone remarked, "You can't get any wetter than wet".

An innovation at this Congress was the trivia night, conducted by Latimah. She combines so many roles. She is a wife, a mother, a medical doctor, and now our vice-chair.

The first 10 questions in the trivia guiz had to do with Subud. I felt that the information behind one of the questions was incorrect, and I called this out to Latimah.

She replied, "Oh, really? Is that so? Well I got the information for that question out of Subud Voice."

So that certainly took the wind out of my sails.

But the next day Latimah told me, "Well I'm not really sure I read it in Subud Voice, but I know I read it somewhere."

The trivia night was a double-barrelled fundraiser for both Susila Dharma and bushfire relief. An auction of paintings was conducted by Bruce, our committee councillor, which raised \$610 for bushfire relief which went to the Red Cross, and more than \$950 for Susila Dharma.

Culture Couch

A tradition at our congresses, and it has also been done at World Congress, is what we call Culture Couch. This is like a TV-style "Parkinson" interview program with congress attendees. The idea for this originated with Sebastian Flynn when he was the SICA chair in Australia and he invited me to take it on because of my experience as an interviewer.

I really enjoy doing it. People tell the most extraordinary stories. Of their work in enterprises, of their spiritual experiences and how Subud and the latihan affect every aspect of their lives.

Of particular interest at this Congress were interviews with members of the third generation of Bapak's family including the international helpers, Madji and Yadi and WSA Executive Chair Suyono, all of whom carry the name Sumohadiwidjojo.

Workshops

Many workshops were held including a sampler version of the YES quest attended by about 20 people in which the newly graduated trainees got to exercise the skills they have learned under Roland's supervision. Though it was only three hours long, compared to a full-on YES Quest which is usually a five-day live-in experience, the power of the Quest was evident in the sampler.

I know that it had a very strong impact on me, not so much bringing new directions, but emphasising how much we need the support of other people and how quickly the YES Quest enables people to bond.

Brianna, our Australian SICA chair organised a fun project. Children were shown how to build their own drive-in cars out of cardboard boxes and then attend a movie. A games afternoon was also held.

There were other workshops on ballet and many on health such as crisis and mental health, touch for health, preventative health, men's health issues, and healthy sleep. As some relief from health, Gavin ran a workshop on keeping native bees.

Entertainment

As always there was lots of informal music making, and the Congress concluded on Friday night with entertainment.

One recalls how long ago in the days of yore, these entertainment programs were often a groan, and one wondered how Bapak was able to sit through them. But this was a really high-class program. Really professional and exciting.

As has become a tradition at our congresses, Audrey from Tasmania assembled and rehearsed a stand-out choir from amongst us.

Other exciting acts were Alyssa from Melbourne who sang a scorching soul song, and Lucida from Cairns, a well-known singer-songwriter who also performed an indigenous song with movements.

However, the most fun act of the night was possibly three girls who performed a song and dance about bananas.

On the way home

I want you all to know that I too have in transition. Sometimes I think my life is a YES Quest.

This year I moved from Melbourne to where I now live in the Northern Rivers. I have bought a caravan in the Mount Warning caravan park from where Subud Voice now emanates.

Mount Warning, or Wollumbin as it is named by the indigenous people, is the iconic landmark in this area, the central plug of an ancient volcano at the centre of a vast caldera, and I am right next to it. People attribute great powers to the mountain.

Around here, they say, what is meant to break will break, and what is meant to come together will come together.

But it is not only in my place of residence that I am seeking to transition. I also want to become more of a performer and my aim is to be a stand-up comic but one who also tell stories that are, meaningful and transformative.

I am very grateful to this Congress as it gave me an opportunity to launch myself in this new direction. I performed as a stand-up comic on the entertainment night. I was able to talk about various funny thing that had happened to me at Congress such as Latimah on the trivia night, or the little girl who is in Transition.

I also inquired into why our WSA chair always wears black. It reminds me of that movie of several years ago called Men in Black about some CIA agents who didn't apprehend ordinary crooks but instead dealt with ghosts, demons, monsters and other entities coming through from the fourth dimension.

In the same way I am sure our "Man in Black" has our backs.

As I drove back to where I live after congress, the time of fire had been replaced by the time of flood. At one point I had to leave the highway because it was flooded. Scarcity of rain had been replaced by abundance.

In Australia these days it is often a choice between fire and flood because near where I now live, in the town of Murwillumbah there had been flood a few years ago in which people had died.

Asking permission

We have amongst our number a wise, but shy and modest woman who lived for a long time in Kalimantan and became very familiar with the notion that there are unseen forces in the world and sometimes it is necessary to ask their permission when we enter their territory.

So, she suggested to me that since Wollumbin is such a powerful geomantic force it might be good for me to ask permission of the mountain before I take up residence beneath it.

So, when I came back, I drove up the Mount Warning Road further than I'd ever been before, up past the caravan park to the mountain itself to ask permission to enter.

It was good to be in the rain forest which was now drenched with rain and all the trees and other plants were drinking up this unaccus-

tomed moisture. And once again the streams, veins and arteries of the country, were flowing.

I was grateful that our Congress had been cool and blessed by rain. And at least in this part of Australia, the bushfire threat had abated.

And in other places like Canberra and Sydney, hailstones as big as golf balls have wreaked havoc, and powerful winds have uprooted trees trapping people in their cars. In some places there are floods; in other water restrictions are being introduced. Weather has become extreme and unpredictable.--



Choosing Names for Subud Children

Harris Smart writes...I'd like to introduce a new feature in Subud Voice. As editor, I am going to republish from time articles from past issues which seem particularly memorable or relevant. For the first of these I have chosen the article "Choosing Names from Subud Children" by Lucas Augustine Adamson which first appeared in Subud Voice in June 2019.

At the WSA meeting in 2019 Ibu Rahayu announced that she wished to retire and would no longer be >

able to answer members' questions or give names. She is appointing a team of three people (Raymond Lee and Tuti and Sharif Horthy) to take over this work.

At a meeting with the International Helpers during her 87th birthday celebrations, Ibu Rahayu had already announced that she will no longer be giving names, saying that we should, by now be able to ask and receive for ourselves. The following prescient article was written by Lucas Augustine Adamson in 2006, updated for a second article in 2013, and here finally! updated in 2020.

Lucas writes

Reading (on Facebook) a new member's questions about Subud name changes has reminded me to share my experience of choosing my three sons' names, in the hope that it might encourage people to test for themselves what their child's name should be.

It is well known that Bapak left Ibu Rahayu in charge of name changes in Subud, and although she received my name for me soon after I joined in 1997, by the time my first son was born, it felt like a huge imposition to ask her to test my son's name on my behalf. Also, I felt that, if I hadn't developed enough in my latihan to receive such a critical thing for myself, then I'm certainly not standing on my own two feet.

I have learned that, as the father, you are the perfect person to test the child's name, being afforded a certain grace to receive the answer.

Just before my first son was born, I was at Loudwater Farm during a visit from a party of national and international helpers. It seemed like an obvious time to test a name and so I grabbed hal dozen or so of them, threw them in a room, and we all tested for a letter.

Let me tell you, it was an eye opener on testing! The helpers received every letter and sound under the sun, and no two were alike. Some helpers were pretty sure they were right, too – after all, a lot of Ibu's responsibilities had been passed over to them by now, so I guess they must have felt competent to do this kind of work.

Spiritually Connected to the Situation

I received an EEEEEEEEEE if it was a boy, and a UUUUUUUUU if a girl. In the face of a whole host of received options, I went with what I had personally received, not out of arrogance, but because I felt that if anybody in that room was spiritually connected to the situation, and qualified to receive such things, then it was most likely to be me.

Unlike personal testing, where we might be subject to a whole host of forces acting upon us to confuse the receiving, I felt quite guided during this session, and able to receive cleanly and clearly, as though testing something abstract, upon which I had neither opinion nor motive. After running though some E names, my son's name was settled as Eli. I wussed out and asked Ibu Rahayu, who confirmed that it was the right name. He's 12 now and it certainly still feels right.

It was that testing session that really cemented for me how important it is to place greater emphasis on one's own receiving than that of other helpers, no matter how great their experience in the kejiwaan.

No doubt it was very helpful to have helpers to test with, broadening the channel through which we can receive, but it feels very important (to me) to receive for myself, and not to "go with the helpers" on things. I was very bold in asserting that I would go with my own receiving, because I guess sometimes you just know, and the helpers were very supportive with that, as it should be.

Looking for the Name beginning with D

I went away and looked for D names that began with not just a letter D, but a DEE sound. They are few and far between, mostly Indian and on my desperate list of about 8 names, I even had Dilraj, until Susannah noted that it was not actually a child's name but an Indian restaurant in Lewes!

Among the options was Dylan, which was about 85% right when we tested it (and a name Susannah had independently intuited for the child). Dhillip and Dilshan were also 85%-ish. Dilbert was also OK (but that was never going to happen.) I was looking for a name that, upon testing, would be a "100% correct" receiving, not an 85% also-ran.

I got quite confused afterwards, and then, realising that the D-L___ names were almost right, 85%ers, returned for a second session with Marcus the next day despite having run out of names. Idly chatting before

the latihan, I considered that maybe I'd been mistaken in my thinking that it was a DEEL__ sound. I came out with, "Bloody hell, wouldn't it be a Subud conspiracy if it was yet another Subud Dahlan!"

My eyes widened, and that wave of revelation came over me as I said the name, and I realised that it was the right name for my son, the one we'd been looking for, and said so to Marcus.

We tested it immediately: it was 100%! So now we have a little Dahlan. I know of 10 of them; all in Subud. The name isn't even a real name out in Muggles world! Good though. I love it!

It's 2019 and Dahlan is 6 years old now, and Susannah and I have just welcomed our third, AND FINAL!!! son together into our family. On the day he was born, our little baby was rushed into the special measures intensive care unit of Hayward's Heath hospital, as he had been born a month premature and by Caesarian section, with both mother and baby having had a rather aggressive fever brought about from sepsis (blood poisoning), the biggest killer of infants and mothers-to-be in pre-industrial times. So, he was born by the surgeon's knife to a life of intravenous antibiotics, a UV light bed, oxygenated breathing assistance and a very worried mother and father that could neither pick him up, console him, nor help in any way beyond our prayers.


I was reminded of the story of how Bapak himself had been in a touch and go medical situation as a child, and how his mother had been instructed to change his name as a matter of urgency in order to save his life. It's with that in mind that Grandad Marcus and I set about to find the right name for the baby on the day he was born.


- 1. How I receive a "yes/positive response/light feeling/the will of God."
 - 2. How I receive a "no/negative response/heavy feeling/not the will of God."
- 3. Whether it is appropriate to do testing about the name of the baby at this time.
- 4. To receive the state of inner quiet required to receive properly and clearly.

This preparation is actually really important, and actually saves time, avoids confusion, and leads to the testing being really effective, I've found.

Marcus and I (and Susannah by phone) went about writing a list of as many I names as we could think of. I've included a photo of that scrappy list, written on the back of a shopping list. From there it was simply a case of going through the list, testing each one. But first, a short-cut: We tested how it was if the name began with an "EYE" sound, and how it was if the name began with a short "i" sound. This allowed us to cross off all of the names beginning with "i" such as lago, lain, Inigo, Idris, Ignatius, Immanuel, Imron, Irving etc.

From there, we had 8 names to test and after

each one, we would each give a percentage score to them: Ira, Ivor, Igor, Ivon, Ifan, Ivan, Isaiah and Isaac. Here's how it turned out:

In the end it was a toss up between Isaac and Ivan, but a second confirmation test clarified that it should be Isaac, and we left feeling confident that in just 1 and a half hours, and on the day of his birth, we had found the right name.

Whether it is true or not that this helped little Isaac we can never know, but it was quite remarkable how fast he healed, each day bringing new positive milestones in his recovery, and within a week he was brought home and is now a happy and healthy bouncing baby boy.

So really, I just want to encourage fathers (and mothers, grandparents!) to test the name of your children for yourselves. It's a really great "rite of passage" venture into fatherhood, and greatly adds to the amazing spiritual experience of parenthood. Its aim was to combine aspects of the Wings of Subud, in this case Culture (SICA) and Health (SIHA). The Human Welfare Wing (Susila Dharma) was also represented as the event became a fundraiser for educating two refugee and asylum seeker women who are supported by Susila Dharma Australia.


The program was greatly enhanced by meals, cakes and coffee provided in a café setting by local mem-

Sharing Experiences of Doing the Latihan

Daniela Moneta, WSA Archivist for Area III writes...

Nobody said that the latihan would be easy. It sometimes helps to hear what others have experienced. The new Subud Archives Online website available to Subud members only has several hundred interviews made for the Memories of Bapak project (1995-2000) of members recalling their memories of Bapak and experiences of the latihan. See instructions at the end of this article about how you can have access to these interviews and much more.



Hearing about other people's experiences can be inspirational and confirming...



One young Subud member said that after he was opened, he took a nap on the floor during latihan for about two years and later found that that was probably the only way he could have gotten quiet. One day he didn't need to take a nap and was singing and moving around during latihan. (Stephen Camp, 1995).

A young hippy member recalls going up to Bapak at the airport in Manchester in 1970 not long after she was opened. Bapak was standing alone with Tuti and Usman waiting for his flight back to London. The helpers were trying to give Bapak some space --when the young woman and her boyfriend walked up to Bapak. Bapak, through Usman, asked "Is there something she would like to know?" Her question and Bapak's way of responding was an experience of a lifetime. (Ismana Carney, 1995) Another member said that after he was opened at his first World Congress at Briarcliff, New York, he started leafing through some Subud books for sale on a table and was astounded to find on each random page -- all the answers to the questions he didn't even know that he had. (Matthew Mayberry, 1995.)

A longtime member who was opened in 1957 at Coombe Springs, said that at the time of his opening he was told nothing about Subud, just asked by John Bennett if he and the others with him wanted to be opened into this new way. All said yes. He recalls at his opening that nothing apparently happened to him. Afterwards, he went for a walk alone in the adjoining park and spontaneously started singing hymns at the top of his voice for about an hour and a half. He just couldn't stop himself. So, he knew that something very important had happened to his life. (Lester Sutherland, 1995.)

Another Subud member said that she was planning to end her lengthy stay at Wisma Subud after the World Congress there in 1971 and relocate to London on Bapak's advice. She was then offered a full-time job teaching at the Jakarta International School. This was a dream job for anyone who wanted a reason to continue to stay in Cilandak. She then went to the Big House to see Bapak who was just leaving for a World Journey. Tuti took her up to Bapak's room and she asked him about taking the job at the International School. He said it would be fine. She then asked Tuti to remind Bapak that he had earlier advised her to move to London. Bapak then said clearly in English, and he repeated it three times: "London is best, London is best," And London was where she went and where she met her husband. (Halimah Bellows-Rochford, 1995.)

In one interview from the Memories of Bapak project, a member asked Bapak in 1959 on Bapak's visit to Norway, "Why do people change names?" Bapak closed his eyes and received for a while and then he said "Your name should begin with an 'H'." (Halstein Stralberg, 1995.) Watch Halstein's Memories of Bapak interview on the archives website to hear what happened after he got his Subud name.

Sometimes just hearing about other people's experiences in Subud, and the ups and downs that happen when we are opened, can be inspirational and a confirmation about what we are going

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The Unfiltered Latihan By Anonymous

Some spiritual experiences are not easy to put into words and share, but it can be helpful to others if we do so. We are fortunate to have Reminders of Reality for this purpose. Thoughts are energy and when we think of others, then that energy goes forth to them. For that reason, I prefer anonymity.

I'm a 79-year-old man, opened in the UK in 1967. After seven years I asked Bapak about my name and also about where I should be living. I then moved overseas with a new name.

Lately, in the midst of a quiet and contented life, I've been experiencing so much synchronicity, so many mini-miracles, that life has become exciting and special.

Accompanying this have been occurrences which I just accepted as signs of ageing. For example, I'd go to think something and the thought just floated off before I could think it.

Then a week ago, I sat in a chair at home to relax and feel quiet when I suddenly found myself on 'the other side'! This wasn't alarming at all and I was gently and lovingly sent back here, but now I know that this is not yet my time to die.

All of the above seems to have been a preparation for what happened yesterday:

At my local Subud group, I'd no sooner stood up to receive, when whoosh – the latihan just spontaneously took off and took over.

I sang and sang in what felt like pure worship of God but so powerful and seemingly independent of me was it, that I literally could not tell if I was singing loudly or softly, because IT was singing ITSELF (as though I wasn't present.) The whole half hour was like that.

Wow! What a surprise. After 52 years of Latihan - many of them spent as Bapak's helper locally and internationally - I was gifted with a totally 'unfiltered' latihan. I hadn't even known my latihan was filtered.

We were told long ago that we could ask "Is there more?"; But all these years I've been quite content to plod on with what felt like a satisfying Latihan.

I attend Latihan once a week and the following latihan (and those since) are back to my "everyday latihan".

No regrets, no ambition is required of me I must just be "Like a corpse in the hands of the body washer" as the saying goes.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, God is as close to us as our breath and this Latihan which we are privileged to receive is a worship of God, which does not come from our ordinary will, but from the Will of Almighty God.

Thank you, Almighty God, for the Latihan and thank you Yang Mulia Bapak for being the channel for this Grace to come to all of mankind.

PRIVATE LATIHANS WITH MAS SUDARTO

Subagio writes from Adelaide, Australia...

Following my opening in Subud at Cilandak by Mas Sudarto and Mas Prio Hartono I participated in the Group Latihan on every latihan night. Normally I would arrive at Mas Sudarto's apartment, one hour or so before the latihan time and Mas Sudarto's very charming wife would serve Mas Sudarto and me a cup of tea soon after I arrived, and then she would disappear for the rest of the evening.

So, before we joined in the group latihan Mas Sudarto would talk of his spiritual experiences since he was opened in Subud over a cup of tea, interestingly enough never talked about RULES in Subud.

(A striking difference from what I saw later on in Australia, where

Helpers are very keen on telling new members of the RULES in Subud, eg. Dress Codes for ladies and took great delight in having the power to command "BEGIN" and "FINISH", and nothing about their spiritual experiences).

After a couple of times in group latihan I told Mas Sudarto and Mas Prio Hartono that the noise in group latihan distracted me from having proper latihan. In those times it was Bapak's routine to do inspection round in the Cilandak compound after dusk, then sometimes he called by at Mas Sudarto's before returning to his house.

At this opportunity Mas Sudarto and Mas Prio Hartono mentioned to Bapak of my problem having latihan with the group.

Bapak paused for a moment's thought, then said to Mas Sudarto and Mas Prio Hartono: "Then one of you must have separate latihans with Subagio", or something to that effect.

(On reflection some twenty five years later I realised that Bapak and senior helpers like Mas Sudarto, as I had experienced myself occasionally, was capable of having "instant testing and receiving").


From then on Mas Sudarto and I had our private latihans separate from the group. Of course I was grateful to Bapak and Mas Sudarto for the special attention given to me in my spiritual development.

When talking and listening can be in latihan

On one latihan evening as usual as soon as I arrived at Mas Sudarto's apartment his wife dutifully served us with a cup of tea, then disappeared for the rest of

the evening in the back room.

As usual Mas Sudarto started talking of his spiritual experiences, words of wisdom and some most intimate subjects like how a married couple should conWe have to receive this latihan every moment, every second, every pulsebeat...



He just kept talking and talking and when I looked at my watch it was already 12.00 midnight. I asked Mas Sudarto; "Mas Sudarto, I thought I was supposed to come here for a latihan with you?".

In a most caring tone he replied softly and politely:

"My younger brother Subagio, did not you realise we have been in latihan in last 4 hours!"

I said: "Oh! have we?". "You realise Mas Sudarto it is midnight already, may I go home now?".

I walked the pitched dark narrow road of Cilandak 5 kms back to Kebayoran, still trying to believe I had been in latihan for 4 hours. The understanding did not come to me until 30 years later when I found myself occasionally talking to someone receptive on spiritual matter in a state of latihan but not quite for 4 hours though, watching TV, or even writing my emails, in effect one has to "connect" or "be in touch" with one's inner all the time.

NOTE: I remember Bapak ever said that he could be in latihan while he was watching TV. Bapak also said in his book "Adam and his children";

"If we want to experience the possibility of improving our being – that is, of returning our being to its original state, to clean it out completely – we have to receive this latihan every moment, every second, every pulsebeat. Every heartbeat, we need to feel the vibration of the life within our life".

My regular private latihans with Mas Sudarto that went on for several months were a special memorable >

experience to me. I always remember Mas Sudarto and his wisdom with love, fondness and gratitude. My special gratitude to Bapak for the latihan and for instructing Mas Sudarto and Mas Prio Hartono to have private latihans with me.

FOUR EXPERIENCES WITH BAPAK

In this article Harris Smart writes about four experiences he had with Bapak, including one of doing sunkum...

SHOULD I WEAR MY HAT OR NOT?

Back in the 70s and 80s I was often fortunate enough to travel around following Bapak on his various tours and I would sometimes write articles about it for Subud publications.

But I was frustrated because I could never get a really good photograph of Bapak.

I am a rather shy person and I find it difficult to walk up to people and thrust a camera in their faces and take their photo. And of course, I was particularly sensitive to this in the case of Bapak

So, I was always taking photographs of him from the back of the room when he was sitting up on the stage and they were always too long distance to be any good.

So, one time when Bapak was visiting Melbourne, I decided to ask if I could make an appointment to take a photograph of him. Sharif arranged this.

What amazed me was how seriously Bapak took this matter. Here was I, a lowly and unknown Subud member, but Bapak took this matter of the photograph as something of great importance that had to be got right. So, there were detailed discussions with Sharif translating about such things as whether it should be indoors or outdoors, and whether he should wear his hat or not.

Finally, it was agreed that it should be outdoors and that he would wear his hat.

I was very nervous taking the photograph because I was in such awe of Bapak and felt so unworthy. Consequently, it was not a very good photograph even though Bapak had prepared himself so conscientiously for it.

I guess every action in our lives is stamped with our thumbprint and in this little anecdote you can see one aspect of me, of how I am sometimes shy and nervous. And this does not produce a good result.

SUNKUM

I was fortunate enough in the 70s and 80s to several times a go to Wisma Subud for Ramadan. On Idul Fitri of course, many people would gather at Wisma Subud, both foreigners and members from all over Indonesia, to do sunkum to Bapak.

So usually a queue of about 1000 people would line up to kneel before Bapak to ask his forgiveness.

So, you waited, waited in the queue and eventually your turn came. And then for the last 10 meters or so you approached Bapak on your knees, and then you rested your forehead on his knee, and you asked forgiveness' (inwardly or outwardly) and then you got up and went down the line asking forgiveness of the members of Bapak's family, before asking forgiveness of everyone.

Well, I always had mixed feelings about this ceremony. I am Australian and we are extremely egalitarian, and we do not believe in standing on ceremony. "Jack's as good as his master" is often our attitude and this is particularly true of the Australians of the Irish variety of which I am a member. We do not believe in bending the knee to anyone.

So, one part of me wanted to go along with this sunkum, and another part of me was in deep rebellion about it. Of course, I understood that it was an Indonesian custom and Indonesian society particularly at that time was still feudal in some of its customs of respect, and so I went along with it.

The divisions and conflicts with in that were felt intensely at that moment reflected a fundamental facture in my attitude to being in Subud. Yes, I want to do it. Yes, know I must do it, I know it is the way for me, but something in me resists it.

So I approached Bapak on my knees several times, but part of me did not really believe it. Part of my heart was not committed to it. Nevertheless, I did it.

I remember one time approaching Bapak in this way and putting my forehead on his knee, doing it and resisting it at the same time, and then I felt Bapak touch me on the back and there was such a feeling, even to my divided heart, of love, comfort, understanding and forgiveness..

BAPAK FALLS IN LOVE

I was fortunate in the 70s and 80s to go several times to Wisma Subud, sometimes for Ramadan, and sometimes for other occasions such as Bapak's birthday.

The usual custom was that when your stay in Wisma Subud was complete, you went to Bapak's house to say goodbye to him. So, one time I did this and altogether there were about 100 of us who were leaving Wisma Subud and wanted to say goodbye to Bapak.

So, we met in his house in the morning and then he came down from upstairs, unshaven still and in an open necked shirt. He seemed to be in a particularly light mood, and he told us that he had been writing his autobiography.

He said that as he travelled around the world, he would spend some time each day writing his autobiography as light relief, and Sharif had been translating it into English. Would we like to hear some of it?

Well, of course we would.

So Bapak had Sharif read the episode where Bapak is travelling on a train to visit a friend who is ill, but at a certain station a young woman gets on the train to whom he is attracted. He notices how the wind twitches her sarong around her ankles.

And he visits his friend, but he can't stop thinking about this woman. So, on his way back home again he gets off the train at the station where the young woman alighted, and he asks about her, and he finds out that she is the daughter of a local religious leader. Subsequently, appropriate approaches are made to her family to open a courtship, and eventually Bapak and Rumindah are married.

It is a very touching and simple episode and the best thing about it is that when Bapak, the Messenger of God, falls in love, he falls in love in just the same way that the rest of us do. He just concentrate on anything except the object of his affection. We glimpse the woman on the train, and we are instantly attracted to her, and we can't think of anything else until we have found her again.

So, we all then said goodbye to Bapak and went out from the big house. A light rain was falling. It was one of those rain's that really seems to come down like a blessing or to mark a special event.

SO MANY LEVELS

One time when Bapak visited Melbourne, I happened to be the chairman of the group. During the visit I had this dream.

We were all sitting in the hall and Bapak was giving a talk. It was very realistic. It was just like the way things were in real life.

Then I noticed a kind of whispering going around the room and eventually the whispering reached the row in front of me and a man turned to me and said, "Bapak needs to go to the toilet and you have to take him."

I protested, "Why must I take him?"

"Because you are the chairman," the man told me.

So, I had to take Bapak from the hall to the nearby house where there was a toilet. In reality, between the hall and the house there is a fairly smooth lawn, but in the dream this had changed, and instead of a nice lawn there was a cactus garden with lots of jagged rocks and cacti and in the dream Bapak was his real age and I was very afraid that Bapak would fall and break some fragile bones and everyone would blame me.

But we made it safely to the house and Bapak went into use the toilet and I sat on a bench waiting for him. Then I looked up and I saw that the house had many levels and women were moving around these levels carrying out various household tasks. And I looked down and I saw that the house also went down for many levels.

And I thought to myself, "Wow! I never knew this house had so many levels!"

THE COVENANT OF MUHAMMAD

Sebastian Paemen writes...

The Ashtiname of Muhammad, also known as the Covenant or Testament of, is a document which is a charter or writ ratified by the Prophet Muhammad granting protection and other privileges to the followers of Jesus, given to the Christian monks of Saint Catherine's Monastery, at the foot of Mount Sinai, Egypt. The document is said to be written by Ali, son in law of the Prophet, who dictated it to him. It is sealed with an imprint representing Muhammad's hand. Āshtīnāmeh is a Persian word meaning "Book of Peace", a Persian term for a treaty and covenant.

"This is a letter which was issued by Mohammed, Ibn Abdullah, the Messenger, the Prophet, the Faithful, who is sent to all the people as a trust on the part of God to all His creatures, that they may have no plea against God hereafter. Verily God is Omnipotent, the Wise. This letter is directed to the embracers of Islam, as a covenant given to the followers of Jesus the Nazarene in the East and West, the far and near, the Arabs and foreigners, the known and the unknown.

This letter contains the oath given unto them, and he who disobeys that which is therein will be considered a disbeliever and a transgressor to that whereunto he is commanded. He will be regarded as one who has corrupted the oath of God, disbelieved His Testament, rejected His Authority, despised His Religion, and made himself deserving of His Curse, whether he is a Sultan or any other believer of Islam. Whenever Christian monks, devotees and pilgrims gather together, whether in a mountain or valley, or den, or frequented place, or plain, or church, or in houses of worship, verily we are [at the] back of them and shall protect them, and their properties and their morals, by Myself, by My Friends and by My Assistants, for they are of My Subjects and under My Protection.

I shall exempt them from that which may disturb them; of the burdens which are paid by others as an oath of allegiance. They must not give anything of their income but that which pleases them—they must not be offended, or disturbed, or coerced or compelled. Their judges should not be changed or provented from accomplishing their offices, par the marks disturbed.

The Covenant document, Note that the drawings on the document were added later. It is not clear by whom.
The provenance of this document is strong. It is mentioned in reliable hadith.
Nevertheless, there are both Christians and Muslims who question its authenticity because it doesn't suit their agendas.

changed or prevented from accomplishing their offices, nor the monks disturbed in exercising their religious order, or the people of seclusion be stopped from dwelling in their cells.

No one is allowed to plunder these Christians, or destroy or spoil any of their churches, or houses of worship, or take any of the things contained within these houses and bring it to the houses of Islam. And he who takes away anything therefrom, will be one who has corrupted the oath of God, and, in truth, disobeyed His Messenger.

Jizya should not be put upon their judges, monks, and those whose occupation is the worship of God; nor is any other thing to be taken from them, whether it be a fine, a tax or any unjust right. Verily I shall keep their compact, wherever they may be, in the sea or on the land, in the East or West, in the North or South, for they are under My Protection and the testament of My Safety, against all things which they abhor.

No taxes or tithes should be received from those who devote themselves to the worship of God in the mountains, or from those who cultivate the Holy Lands. No one has the right to interfere with their affairs, or bring any action against them. Verily this is for aught else and not for them; rather, in the seasons of crops, they should be given a Kadah for each Ardab of wheat (about five bushels and a half) as provision for them, and no one has the right to say to them 'this is too much', or ask them to pay any tax.

As to those who possess properties, the wealthy and merchants, the poll-tax to be taken from them must not exceed twelve drachmas a head per year (i.e. about 200 modern day US dollars).

They shall not be imposed upon by anyone to undertake a journey, or to be forced to go to wars or to carry arms; for the Muslims have to fight for them. Do no dispute or argue with them, but deal according to the verse recorded in the Quran, to wit: 'Do not dispute or argue with the People of the Book but in that which is best' [29:46]. Thus they will live favored and protected from everything which may offend them by the Callers to religion (Islam), wherever they may be and in any place they may dwell.

Should any Christian woman be married to a Muslim, such marriage must not take place except after her consent, and she must not be prevented from going to her church for prayer. Their churches must be honored and they must not be withheld from building churches or repairing convents.


They must not be forced to carry arms or stones; but the Muslims must protect them and defend them against others. It is positively incumbent upon every one of the follower of Islam not to contradict or disobey this oath until the Day of Resurrection and the end of the world.'

Note that when the letter uses the word 'Islam' it refers to those who 'surrender to God'. This includes anybody, Christians, Jews, etc. The religion of Muhammad wasn't called 'Islam' yet in those days.



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
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
